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### Sources for use with Section A.

**Source 1:** From a speech by A O Hume, 'The Indian National Congress, its Origin, Aims, and Objects', made to a great meeting at Allahabad on 30 April 1888. The speech was later published in a newspaper. Hume, a British civil servant working in India, was given permission by the Viceroy to establish the Indian National Congress in 1885.

To understand the Indian National Congress thoroughly, it is necessary to understand the basic principles that were established by the Congress for its own guidance. These were the principles out of which the Congress and many other social and more spiritual movements had their origin.

The principles – the fundamental objectives of what its founders called the National Movement – were threefold: 5

First: The fusion of all the different and, until recently, conflicting elements that make up the population of India into a single national unity;

Second: The gradual development of the nation that has begun to evolve; and

Third: The consolidation of the union between England and India by ensuring the modification of any aspects of the union that may be unjust or harmful to India. 10

**Source 2:** From Romesh Dutt, *India in the Victorian Age*, published 1904. Dutt was an Indian civil servant and a member of the Bengal Legislative Council. He was the president of the Indian National Congress in 1899. Here he comments on railway schemes in India.

In 1873, an official wrote, 'Railways are now almost completed, so we expect the financial position in India will improve.' However, substantial spending on the construction of railways did not end. The recommendation by the Famine Commission to give priority to irrigation works has been ignored. 15

The reason irrigation works were not prioritised is because the Indian Administration is influenced by public opinion in England and not by the opinion of the Indian people. Englishmen understand railways but do not understand the importance of irrigation for India. English manufacturers look to railway extensions as the way to access distant markets in India. English Members of Parliament urge the construction of new railway lines. 20

However, there have been difficulties in constructing new lines in India, where the people are poor and railways not always profitable. Government appealed to private companies, but businessmen would not invest without a clear guarantee of profits from India's revenues. However, the Indian people do not ask for the construction of more railways from taxes paid by them. The Famine Commission of 1897 does not think that more railways are needed to provide help transporting food in times of famine. India can wait for private companies to find it profitable enough to build new lines without requiring a guarantee of profits from our taxes. 25 30
