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Extracts for use with Section A.

Extract 1: From A Forrest, *Napoleon*, published in 2012.

Despite a victory at Dresden in August 1813, the French went on to suffer a series of minor defeats that forced Napoleon to concentrate his forces around Leipzig. It was here, in October 1813, that the decisive battle of the war was fought. At the 'Battle of the Nations', the French fought the combined armies of Austria, Prussia and Russia. This coalition was supplemented by the armies of several of Napoleon's former German allies. These former allies now joined his enemies sensing that Napoleon was in decline. 5

The Battle resulted in huge losses on both sides. French deaths were estimated at fifteen thousand, while a further thirty thousand were wounded. It was a decisive defeat for Napoleon, which forced him to retreat towards the River Rhine and then on to French territory. The French inner empire was now also collapsing; Napoleon was forced to call up older French reservists and boys still too young to be conscripted. 10

French-controlled lands on the west bank of the Rhine, Holland, and then Belgium fell to the coalition forces. By the beginning of 1814, Blücher's army had crossed the Rhine, leaving the final stages of the war to be fought on the home soil of France. 15

Extract 2: From M Rapport, *The Napoleonic Wars*, published in 2013.

After the Battle of Borodino against the Russians in September 1812, Napoleon was in control of Moscow for only a month. The city around his base in the Kremlin was burned to the ground, probably by patriotic Russians. In October 1812, the disastrous French retreat from Russia began. The French retreated through a Russian winter that started early. The Russians kept up the pressure from behind, with Cossack soldiers hounding the French soldiers in the sub-zero temperatures. Only 20,000 men out of Napoleon's main invasion force escaped from Russia. 20 25

The terrible defeat in Russia in 1812 was a turning point. It devastated Napoleon's forces in the east. While he was able to replace the vast loss of human life, he never recovered from the dreadful death toll on the army's horses. Together, the Russian victory and the Spanish resistance energised the other European powers. The Russian invasion of Poland in the spring of 1813 encouraged the Prussians, still seething from the humiliations of 1806–07, to rise up against Napoleon. By June, the Sixth Coalition included Britain, Spain, Portugal, Russia, Prussia and Sweden. The allied forces, now including Austria, converged on Leipzig in October 1813 where in the epic three-day 'Battle of the Nations' the French lost vast numbers of men. French power in Germany now rapidly collapsed and the Napoleonic Empire unravelled. 30 35
